The Corps is open to everyone in SWLACF, and it provides excellent opportunities: Learning to play the bugle, flute, or side drum (which can be used as your Skill section for Duke of Edinburgh).

National Music Camps take place twice a year, in the Easter holidays and October Half Term. This October we went to Altcar camp near Liverpool, meeting over 200 cadets, and had cadets across all Star Levels, as well as an instructor on the Adult Development Course. The camp provides an opportunity to learn and practice without getting moaned at by parents and neighbours, and to be taught by the best instructors from across both the Army Cadet Forces and the Army School of Ceremonial, and ask anyone who went, and they'll tell you they had one of the best camps they've been on.

If you want to get involved, there's ample opportunities. The first Saturday of every month, there's a music training day at Sector HQ, and starting in the new year there will be regular music training nights, open to the entire Company, at 149 Detachment in West Norwood. On a final note, whether you can play or read music or not, or even if you think "I'm useless, I could never do that", give it a go. You'll never be judged, you'll never be the only one learning, and you just might surprise yourself

CSM Corner

There have been a lot of questions around hair styles and how cadets can and cant have their hair. To clarify below is the policy that must be followed.

Female cadets and CFAVs. In addition to wearing their hair short or in a bun, all female cadets and CFAVs may also wear their hair in a single ponytail or braid when in uniform and where it is safe to do so on an activity. They may also wear their hair in twists, corn rows or locks where this does not cover the face or reach onto the collar.

Male cadets and CFAVs. In addition to wearing their hair short, all male cadets and CFAVs may also wear well-groomed twists, corn rows and locks if they do not cover the face or reach onto the collar or ears.

Safety and hygiene. The policy does not remove or override safety and hygiene requirements. Where there is a risk of hair becoming entangled in weapons or equipment, it must be tied up securely to reduce this risk.

General guidelines.

When in uniform, hair should be neatly groomed and secured back or styled away from the face. Hairstyles should not be exaggerated in nature and must be such that all types of military headdress can be worn in the correct manner. Hair should not be visible on the forehead under the brow band of the headdress or cover the ears.

Hair colour. Hair should be of an even natural colour and not detract from a smart appearance.

Ceremonial dress. Hair must be well groomed and secured back from the face when in ceremonial dress. Long hair should be worn in a properly secured bun.

STEM Camp

STEM camp is an integrated educational approach focused on teaching science, technology, engineering and maths in a way that excites and engages young people. STEM expertise is integral to the functioning of the British Army, and it features in many ways throughout the Army Cadets' programming, from signals to navigation.

Topics will vary for each session, but they will all focus on the skills and techniques used to overcome military problems in various scenarios by using STEM. You can expect intelligence missions, breakout rooms, challenges, quizzes and the chance to ask the experts questions.

Each cadet will spend 2.5 hours each morning immersed in these scenarios, with afternoons free to enjoy the half term break. There will also be guest speakers on two of the evenings – a Cadet Ambassador and an Army Recruitment presentation on STEM careers.
